This week started with assemblies for Safer Internet Day. On Tuesday, the children engaged with learning based around the theme 'Inspiring change? Making a difference, managing influence and navigating change online'.

For Safer Internet Day, Year 3 were thinking about technology through time. We explored what technology used to be like when the teachers were younger, then made predictions about how it will advance in the future! Dotty thinks everyone will have laptops built into their desks with an interactive whiteboard each so we don't have to look at the screen. Martha believes we won't even need to go to school as we will use VR headsets to get ourselves there! To help them understand how to develop a healthy and balanced meal, they created a plate using the five different food groups.
